150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Festival Evensong 22<sup>nd</sup> June 2025

Welcome to Eltham Parish Church of St John the Baptist. Prayer has been offered in this place for almost a thousand years, and your participation in today's service is warmly welcomed.

As well as being part of our annual patronal festival for St John the Baptist, this year our service celebrates the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the consecration of our church. The present 'new' church was built between 1872-1879, on the site of a previous church that had stood here since 1667. On 3<sup>rd</sup> August 1875 the new church was consecrated in a service presided over by the Bishop of Rochester. Over June we have hosted a variety of events to commemorate the sesquicentennial of the church, the last of which is this special festival evensong. We are most grateful to the Very Reverand Dr Mark Oakley, Dean of Southwark Cathedral, for preaching this evening.

At choral Evensong, much of the service is sung by the choir on our behalf. The congregation participates through presence and listening, and in singing the congregational hymns, that the words and the music might become a prayer within us and lift us to contemplate God's beauty and glory.

Today for this very special service, we are grateful to the many guest singers who have joined us from across Eltham and beyond, to help mark 150 years of worship at St John's. We are also joined by choir director Simon Hiller of St Mark & St Margaret's, Plumstead, and by three 'generations' of St John's organists and former organists.

Amongst the music sung by our combined choirs today is Sir Hubert Parry's famous setting of 'I Was Glad', a text made up of selected verses from Psalm 122. A musical setting of this text has been performed by choirs at every coronation of a British monarch since that of King Charles I in 1626. It is thus a fittingly grand and celebratory anthem to cap our service of thanksgiving today.

The service always includes one or more psalms. These ancient prayers, taken from the Old Testament, reflect the full range of human emotions and experiences; from the depths of anger, resentment, and abandonment to the heights of ecstatic joy and praise. They were used by Jesus and have always been at the heart of the Church's daily prayer.

The canticles *Magnificat* (Luke 1: 46–55) and *Nunc dimittis* (Luke 2: 29–32) reflect two responses to the Incarnation (God becoming fully human in Jesus Christ). Both speak of the fulfilment of God's promises, not just to 'Abraham and his seed', but also 'to be a light to lighten the Gentiles' (all nations). With their themes of fulfilment and completion, these texts have been given central place for many centuries in the Church's prayers for the evening and at the end of the day.

Please join in saying the words and singing the hymns printed in **bold type**. For those unfamiliar with the format of evensong, instructions for when to **sit and to stand** are marked with the symbol ¶.


